Director's Note

The Festival of the Actors has always been a student production, evolving from monologues to student-written works and improvisational interludes. Vestiges is meant to look at the fragments of protection between ourselves and other people, whether they are placed by someone else, one's own self, or society. And although most of these fragments and masks can have negative connotations, what does it mean when it's all stripped away? Are those fragments actually what is holding us together?

Pretty looks at how a singular obsession can be all-consuming and detrimental--causing us to lose sight of ourselves and how many facets we have.

Defenseless is the story of a young girl who has to overcome the mask given her by an oppressive society, and how the small can fight back.

That Odd Tea, while being a hilarious shop to walk into, looks at how a bunch of bored people can mess with other's lives.

The Couch examines a relationship we've all witnessed or been a part of--there's a problem, and we're not willing to address it.

Aesthetically, the show is purposefully an amalgamation of items from different cultures and different times. Yes, the idea of fragmental protection applies to each show; but it's also important for each person to look at what is holding them where they are.

I'd like to thank my cast and crew (they are wonderful in every way, and I love each one of them), David Crawford (a wonderful mentor and editor), and my parents (who don't know the show exists).
