### DIRECTOR'S NOTE

They 'met, woo'd and made exchange of vow' in a single evening, then gave their hearts away, only a week later to take their own lives.

Greatest love story ever told, or misguided middle school hallway romance; Shakespeare's Twilight, a young adult paperback?

In high school, reading it aloud line by line, I confess, my opinion was closer to the latter. But when I read it again last year, before the first act was over, I was in love. I started to think about how to encourage others to see the story in a new light as well.

It wasn't so long ago in the United States that someone could justifiably be shot on the street to avenge a wrong. Our country was built by immigrants and settlers, and feuds were common occurrences, most famously the Hatfields and the McCoys. Marshals like Wyatt Earp and Seth Bullock were famous for being the few that could temper the lawless west, and in reading of their endeavors to temper the daily skirmishes in the streets, I was reminded of the prince and his futile struggle to keep peace amongst the Capulets and the Montagues of Shakespeare's Verona.

Thus the prince became a Sheriff, the Capulets saloon owners, and the Montagues early ranch owners who clashed with the new ownership Capulet had taken of the town. Romeo went away to school and read the romantics and the transcendentalists, and came back home hoping for peace. When he meets Juliet, sheltered by her family in a town made unsafe by their own feud, who has spent all her time reading the romantics, their fated love is instant.

Hate has a hold on Verona, but Romeo and Juliet choose another way.

Alone on her balcony, not knowing Romeo is listening below, Juliet ponders the meaning of a name, and realizing it doesn't matter, says:

"Romeo, doff thy name, And for thy name, which is no part of thee, Take all myself."

Romeo finishes her line for her,

"I take thee at thy word. Call me but love, and I'll be new baptized."

Romeo and Juliet don't experience love until each other. Having been without it, they refuse to let it go.

"Death cannot hold love out, and what love can do, that dares love attempt."

Love. Death. Hate. Faith. Loss. Life. Hope. Juliet and her Romeo. Shakespeare recognized that humans share their life experiences through story, and sometimes only in allegory and theatre, on a stage, can we confront the reality of our living and our losses, together. Sometimes we are misguided, and our "violent delights have violent ends."

In this production, we explore what happens when violence is not tempered, when revenge is always meted out, and there is no room for love. Thank you for joining us for the next 'two hours traffic of our stage,' somewhere in the Wild West, Verona, 1880.

This play contains realistic themes and images. Prop weapons are used to lend us the authenticity of those moments, and they are loud, as gunshots so often are. Please consider your sensitivity to sound and violent themes before attending this show. We have tested the sound of each weapon being used in this space to ensure the volume is always at a safe level: earplugs are available upon request. We have chosen to be as realistic as possible, as befits a tragedy.

Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC in the spring of 2012.

Last year more than 1,300 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.

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
