

Beginning in 1961 Mrs. Donnie Rigby directed a stage play for the Walla Walla College women's club weekend. From this beginning, drama offerings expanded to a fully staged play being produced at least once a year. The rich tradition continues today, growing into two facilities and a full season, including two main stage productions, and an annual student-directed Festival of Shorts. This festival began as the "Play Direction Class" productions May 13, 1973. It has been running most years since then and we are so excited to bring it to you again.

Producer's Note

This festival means a lot to me. Over my years here both as the director of the program and as a student, I have seen a multitude of beautiful shows created by passionate student directors.

The Festival began with the "Play Direction Class" in 1973 and is still going. I believe that is because the experience of selecting, casting, directing, and presenting a work of theatre is unique. It requires a person to be in touch with their own emotional core as well as those of their actor's and audience. It requires a deep consideration of audience, purpose, and message. It requires a consideration of this university and its mission.
